# Message from the President


The Hong Kong College of Family Physicians would like to echo the Editorial on 18-11-2009 concerning how the two medical schools should cater to society's needs for family doctors.

The issue was brought up in August this year when the Medical Council communicated with the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine and suggested a review of postgraduate training requirements for the specialty of Family Medicine. As a consequence, our College was requested by the Academy to submit our views. Following that, the College established an Ad Hoc group to study the issue comprehensively.

As a first and important comment, we believe the review undertaken by the Academy should be extended to cover undergraduate teaching of Family Medicine in medical schools. Our College has the following viewpoints regarding undergraduate medical teaching in Hong Kong.

- 1. The two medical schools should strive to establish an INDEPENDENT Department of Family Medicine with adequate funding to support a team of staff of optimal size whose primary tasks should be teaching and research. In fact, this is supported by the recommendation made by two internationally renowned visiting Professors to Hong Kong this year. We believe the resource allocation and emphasis in undergraduate teaching is grossly inadequate. In addition, the hierarchy accorded to Family Medicine in the medical schools as an affiliation or subordination does not reflect the important role played by it in our modern world. Family Medicine is a unique and important discipline on its own. Teaching of Family Medicine should not be confused or mixed up with teaching of Community Medicine or Public Health.
- 2. The Medical Council is duty-bound and has rightly pointed out the deficiencies of the two Universities in relation to the undergraduate medical curriculum. Our College is in full support of the findings and the recommendations in the report released in January 2009 that "The team proposed that both Medical Faculties be required to improve on the teaching of Family Medicine." These issues are of paramount importance to the development of the discipline

of Family Medicine and the Healthcare Reform proposed by the Government. Changes should be made as soon as feasible to complement the reform led by the Government. It is regrettable if opportunities are missed because of



3. Our College is an academic institute which has been striving to achieve it objectives of promoting and upgrading the standard of Primary Care services in the past 30 year. However, there has been little improvement in the Primary Healthcare system in the past 2 or 3 decades owing to the under estimation of the importance of undergraduate teaching. We believe many of our medical graduates have probably failed to understand or appreciate the attributes in Family Medicine which their colleagues chose to specialize in, due to their minimal exposure to the teaching of Family Medicine throughout their career training and this would also explain why they opt for other specialties. This situation is definitely not conducive to the long term development of Family Medicine.

If the circumstances described should continue to prevail, the role of our discipline in the healthcare system will never be firmly established. The foundation of Primary Care will never be solid enough for policymakers to rely on and will result in adverse decisions being made on resource allocation in healthcare service delivery. The Government has an obligation to meet the society's needs of a proper "family doctor-led" Primary Care service which has long been overdue.

An Open Forum on Family Medicine Education and Training is scheduled on 16th January 2010. Our College will need to propose an overall review and appropriate suggestions for any changes to be made in the future. I urge Members and Fellows to register and come to contribute in the discussion. Further details about the rundown of the Forum will be circulated via email and posted in our website.

(Submission Deadline: 31 March 2010)

We cordially invite your participation in the Full Paper Competition of the HKCFP ASM 2010. The Competition is a long-standing tradition of HKCFP ASM for promoting and recognizing well-designed, innovative research, which bears potential to exert impact in clinical practice or development in the field of family medicine.

The HKCFP ASM 2010 Organizing Committee will invite renowned scholars to review the participating papers. Judges appointed by the Organizing Committee will determine the final awardees based on qualities of the papers.

The winner will be awarded the Best Research Paper Award, which will be presented at the opening ceremony of the HKCFP ASM 2010. The winning team will also be featured in our college newsletter – Family Physicians Links (FP Links).

#### **Awards**

The Best Research Paper Award winner will receive HK\$5,000 and a certificate.

#### **Eligibility Requirements and Author Guidelines**

To be eligible for participation in the full paper competition, the first author of the paper must meet ALL of the following conditions:

- (1) The author is currently a member of the HKCFP
- (2) The author completes the main parts of the research and writing for the paper;
- (3) The author has not used the paper to apply for other awards

The participating papers should be full-length articles. They should include a structured abstract of no more than 250 words, the text should contain between 2,000-3,000 words, organized as INTRODUCTION, METHODS, RESULTS and DISCUSSIONS, and consist of no more than 5 illustrations (tables/figures).

#### **Award Selection Criteria**

Each paper will be evaluated against the following criteria:

- 1. Academic rigor of the paper (e.g. originality, methodology, organization and presentation)
- 2. Relevance to family medicine (e.g. importance of the topic and the impact of the findings on the practice or development of family medicine)

#### **How to Submit**

All submitted full papers will be automatically enrolled into the Best Research Paper Award. Participants should submit their papers according to the abstract submission instructions.

- The abstract must not exceed 250 words, and should be organized as follows: TITLE, AUTHOR(S),
   INTRODUCTION, METHODS, RESULTS and DISCUSSIONS. Commentaries and discussion papers do not need to follow this exact format apart from TITLE and AUTHOR(S).
- · Authors' full names and affiliations must be specified; surnames should be in bold.
- All abstracts must be submitted in English or Chinese; and all accepted abstracts must be presented in English.

# Diploma in Family Medicine (HKCFP) 1st Announcement

The Board is pleased to announce that the Diploma Course in Family Medicine (DFM) organized by The Hong Kong College of Family Physicians will commence in June 2010.

The course consists of FIVE modules. Modules I & II will be delivered by Local Distance Learning. Modules III, IV & V consist of lectures, seminars, tutorials, workshops and clinical attachments. The whole course requires ONE year of part-time studies.

Details of the course are as follows:

#### 1. Objectives:

- i) To provide knowledgeable, pragmatic and structured teaching in Family Medicine for medical practitioners
- ii) To encourage professional development of practising medical practitioners and to provide an intermediate step to fellowship qualifications in Family Medicine

# Primary Care Symposium 2009: Primary Care for Hong Kong - the Way Forward

We were most pleased to welcome our 2009-2010 HKCFP Visiting Professor, Barbara Starfield, who is University Distinguished Professor at Johns Hopkins University and a world-renowned expert in primary care evaluation and policy. Her weeklong visit to the Family Medicine Unit, HKU, culminated in this primary care symposium whose focus was to explore the way forward for primary care development in Hong Kong.



Close to 200 people attended the symposium including respected scholars from the two medical faculties in Hong Kong, senior representatives of the Hong Kong Medical Council, the Hospital Authority, and the Hong Kong College of Family Physicians as well as passionate views from grass roots medical professionals and primary care stakeholders.

I am happy to highlight some of the key points brought up during the presentations and panel discussion.

#### **Key Points:**

#### Opening addresses:

With the symposium fortuitously coming on the heels of the Chief Executive's Policy Address, Dr. York Chow reiterated the Government's commitment to "break new ground together" in targeting the area of primary care. Recurrent financial support earmarked for primary care, a focus on the whole primary health care delivery model, a directory for primary care and improvements to management of chronic disease and mental health services, as well as a territory-wide electronic health record system were among

the initiatives outlined.

Professor Raymond Liang foreshadowed an integral theme which recurred throughout the symposium, invoking the guiding principles of primary care and family medicine: being the point of first coritact and provider of continuing, comprehensive, coordinated, whole-person care.

#### Keynote presentation:

Professor Barbara Starfield provided convincing evidence-based arguments reaffirming the benefits of primary care to lay the foundation for the later discussion on the way forward for primary care in Hong Kong. In short:

Primary care gives better health outcomes. This occurs among countries as well as within countries. A stark example of countries with the highest GDP demonstrating a paradoxical drop in life expectancy was shown. Coincidentally these are also the countries with specialist-driven health care, e.g. United States, Singapore. Primary care oriented countries have better life expectancy, lower infant mortality with fewer low birth weight infants while within countries, areas with better primary care have lower mortality rates and earlier detection of cancers.

Primary care reduces inequity in health. There is a demonstrated positive association between having primary care and lower mortality rates which is more pronounced in socially disadvantaged groups. Another example is the survival advantage for breast cancer seen in those who are younger and with later stage diagnosis in countries with a stronger primary care system. Such patients benefit from the functions of primary care including provision of comprehensive care especially when there is co-morbidity, person focused care over time, accessibility to service, coordination, and prevention.

Primary care costs less. In the United States, for example, health care is characterized by high referral rates, excessive follow up visits by specialists, and a high percentage of patients with high morbidity burden, who are seeing specialists. All these are expensive for the health care system. The benefits of primary care are greatest for

people with the greatest burden of illness as there is a single doctor to provide the continuous, comprehensive and coordinated care. Family physicians are more cost effective than other primary care physicians such as paediatricians or internists. This underlines the important role of gate-keeping to assure more appropriate and thus effective specialist care.

Health system policies conducive to primary care practice are needed. Policies must focus on the function of primary care (patient focus) rather than professional priority of diagnosis (disease focus). The roles and principles of primary care come into play because it is the frequent consultations by patients with co-morbidities who consume the most resources and who would benefit most from the person-focused care over time (better outcomes, fewer side effects, lower cost, thus better population health).

There are key system factors which help achieve good primary care. Such features include: universal financial coverage, under government control or regulation; need-based distribution of resources; no or low co-payments; and comprehensive service. These result in better health at lower cost as exemplified in primary health care oriented countries.

#### Panel discussion:

Dr. Donald Li drew attention to the May 2009 WHO resolution asking members to reinvigorate their health systems through primary care. He encouraged the review of the undergraduate FM medical curriculum and post-graduate FM training programmes to attract and inspire more graduates to select primary care medicine as their career choice. In addition, he reiterated the conclusions of the Primary Care Working Group, including the development of a primary care directory, pilot community health centre projects, and the considered development of management protocols.

Professor Sian Griffiths advocated the further blending of individual health care and public health by fostering an environment where health care professionals can understand the importance of prevention, social determinants of disease and equity, so that patients and doctors can work as a team to promote population and community based care that is responsive to their needs. This was echoed by Professor TH Lam who felt that goodwill and room for partnership between public health and primary care can occur over time, involving medical education and professional training, health services research and education, health promotion and health advocacy.

Dr. Gene Tsoi expressed concern about the state of FM education which forms the foundation for the delivery of quality-assured primary care. Dr. SV Lo suggested streamlining FM post graduate training and reconsidering the need for 2 years of hospital training. Further, system incentives for doctors may be worthwhile, e.g. remuneration based on doctor qualifications and engagement in whole person, comprehensive care.

Professor Cindy Lam cautioned that suboptimal primary care may do more harm than no primary care at all. To ensure quality primary care, primary care must be enabled to deliver what it should deliver based on research evidence (on health services as well as individual clinical care), education and training (focused on patient-centred attitudes and a high level of competence to provide comprehensive care rather than the ability to merely practice independently), be empowered to provide the care it can provide through an administrative and funding system that allows for proper gate-keeping, coordination of care and access to necessary resources; and must engage doctors to work in primary care by setting the expectation that all people should have their own family doctor and fundamentally changing the mindset of all stakeholders that primary care is an essential part of all health services.





#### Conclusion:

From observation of the proceedings and subsequent feedback from participants and attendees, the aim of the symposium to engage academic colleagues and fellow health care professionals in constructive debate and discussion about the way forward for primary care in Hong Kong was overwhelmingly achieved. A summary document of recommendations based on the discussions raised in this symposium will be presented to government for consideration and hopefully it will contribute to real progress.

點從小朋友的身上更能看得到, 他們沒有漂亮 而整齊的衣服和鞋,沒有遊戲機, 只和他們玩 一些簡單的遊戲, 他們已經樂上大半天。這些 從心裡綻放出來的笑容, 在香港已愈來愈少, 是香港的生活比他們的更貧窮嗎?香港各式各 樣的物質都有, 但每天看見不快樂或患抑鬱的病 人愈來愈多,是我們比他們貧窮嗎?似乎,是我 們的「心靈」更「貧窮」。

# A Chance not to be Missed

The Elderly Vaccination Subsidy Scheme (EVSS) was launched on 19th October this year. Under this scheme, government subsidizes those aged 65 or above with at least \$130 and \$190 for seasonal influenza and pneumococcal vaccination respectively. However, until 15th November, only about 10% of the elderly population has been vaccinated.

There are currently two types of pneumococcal vaccine available, namely a 23-valent pneumococcal polysaccharide vaccine (23vPPV) and a 7-valent pneumococcal conjugate vaccine (PCV7). PCV7 is registered for use in Hong Kong for children up to 9 years whereas 23vPPV for anyone 2 years or above. PCV7 has been included in the Childhood Immunization Programmed since 1st September 2009.

According to the Centre of Health Protection, pneumococcal vaccination is recommended for personal protection in the following groups<sup>2</sup>:

- 1. Children below 2 years of age, with or without additional at-risk conditions
- 2. Persons aged 65 years or above, with or without additional at-risk conditions
- 3. Persons aged between 2 to 65 years and with the following at-risk conditions:
  - (a) History of invasive pneumococcal disease
  - (b) Immunocompromised states:
    - Asplenia, HIV, primary immunodeficiency
    - Immunodeficiencies related to malignancies and transplantation
    - Immunodeficiencies related to use of immunosuppressive drugs / systemic steroid
  - (c) Chronic disease
    - Chronic cardiac, pulmonary, liver or renal disease
    - Diabetes mellitus or CSF leakage
  - (d) With cochlear implants

One single dose vaccination is effective for 5 to 10 years. Its safety and side effect profile is also good. The most common adverse event is slight swelling and tenderness at the injection site (30–50%, more commonly following subcutaneous administration than intramuscular administration<sup>3</sup>). Systemic reactions are rare. Revaccination 5 years after the first dose should be considered for indicated populations, but the safety of revaccination for more than two doses is currently not known. Similarly, safety data for vaccination in pregnancy has not been established.

23vPPV is effective in preventing potential life threatening conditions like otits media, pneumonia, meningitis and septicemia. Meta-analysis of randomized controlled trials showed protective effect against invasive pneumococcal disease (IPD) and all-cause pneumonia among generally healthy young adults and, to a lesser extent, protection against IPD in the general elderly population.<sup>3-4</sup> Observational studies on the effectiveness of PPV23 generally have shown that the vaccine is effective in preventing IPD among individuals with various underlying illnesses who are not severely immunosuppressed.<sup>3</sup>

# Interest Group in Dermatology - the 17th Meeting on 7th November 2009

The 17<sup>th</sup> Dermatology Interest Group meeting was held on 7<sup>th</sup> Nov 2009. Our speaker was Dr. K. K. Fung, a consultant dermatologist of St. Paul's Hospital. Our sponsor was Galderma Hong Kong Ltd. The topic was "Use of topical agents in dermatology".

In choosing a topical medication, we have to consider both the active ingredient and the vehicle. The active ingredient is the drug we choose to treat the skin condition, examples are topical steroid, antibiotics, antifungal and antiviral agents. The vehicle is a mixture of liquid, powder, grease, preservatives, emulsifier, absorption promotor, fragrance etc, in various combinations, to maximize delivery of the active ingredient to the skin. It can have action of its own, and may even do harm if being used carelessly. Aqueous cream is derived from petroleum. Fragrance is used to cover up its smell, but sometimes it may induce sensitivity reactions. When water is present in the vehicle, preservatives must be added to prevent bacterial and fungal growth. Ointments have no water and can be preservative-free.

Choice of a vehicle depends on both nature and location of the dermatosis.

- (1) Nature: one should consider the old dogma: "wet on wet and dry on dry", i.e. use wet formulation for oozing dermatoses e.g. lotion, use dry formulation for dry dermatoses e.g. ointment.
- (2) Location: for skin folds, use cream. Too aqueous formulations like lotion may sting while ointment may cause occlusion.

There are several factors affecting the absorption of a drug through skin:

- (1) Broken skin increases absorption
- (2) Thin skin increases absorption when comparing with forearm skin, absorption is 13 times more on cheek and 40 times more at scrotum. Similarly, infants and elderly with thin skin have increased absorption.
- (3) Occlusion of skin surface (e.g. by tegaderm) increases absorption
- (4) Higher frequency and quantity of drug applied increase absorption. Some drugs like topical steroid have reservoir effect in stratum corneum, hence having prolonged action even after their use is stopped.

When prescribing a topical medication especially one containing topical steroid, there are several principles to observe:

(1) Try to establish diagnosis of the skin lesion first before prescribing a drug, particularly do not use steroid as a test. If there is no improvement after using topical steroid, do not rush to increase the potency, reconsider the diagnosis.

- (2) Choose the right active ingredient and vehicle, and the right concentration and potency according to nature of skin lesion, anatomical sites, age and other patient factors such as pregnancy. Very potent topical steroid should only be used for a short time if really necessary. It should not be stopped suddenly to avoid rebound, and progressively weaker steroid should be used for tailing down. It should not be used on face, flexures and scrotal areas with thin skin.
- (3) Determine the frequency, quantity and duration of treatment.

When using topical medications, always be aware of its potential side effects. Commonly encountered side effects include:

- (1) Allergic and irritant contact dermatitis can be related to active ingredients or vehicles
- (2) Photosensitivity e.g. topical vitamin A derivatives
- (3) Tachyphylaxis e.g. after prolonged use of topical steroid
- (4) Local and systemic complications of topical steroid

Dr. Fung also reminded the audience not to try mixing various topical medications in their clinics because:

- (1) There may be interactions between various active ingredients.
- (2) Active ingredients may be inactivated when the diluents are incompatible e.g. when oil- in- water formulations are mixed with water- in- oil formulations.
- (3) There is always risk of bacterial and fungal contamination.
- (4) Uneven mixing can result in varied concentration of active ingredients in various parts of the mixture.


